Jewish and secular holidays are guided by two very different calendars. Like our solar calendar periodically requires a leap day on Feb 29, so too our Jewish lunar calendar needs a leap month seven times every 19 years. The leap month, called *Adar 1*, begins this year on February 10.

The Jewish calendar undergoes an intercalation, reconciling the Jewish lunar and secular solar calendar, to enable us to observe Passover in the spring, as Deuteronomy commands us to do (Deuteronomy 16:1). If we didn't periodically insert *Adar 1* into our calendar, we'd be celebrating Passover (and the rest of our holy days) earlier and earlier and it would be quite disconcerting to celebrate Passover in the winter, and eventually in the fall and summer!

January 27 is International Holocaust Remembrance Day. The UN General Assembly chose this date because this is the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau. We were blessed to welcome Holocaust survivor Edith Jucker to *Shaarey Tzedek* on this day and hear her compelling story during our *Havdalah* gathering. May we all take to heart Edith's timely message, "We must make sure life and love survive hate."

Jews around the world also commemorate *Yom HaShoah* on the 27th of *Nisan*, the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising. Unnervingly, "Never Again is Now" (Rabbi Daniel Bouskila's article published January 25, 2024 in the <u>Jewish Journal</u> is titled, "Never Again is Now: October 7 & Holocaust Remembrance Day"). Israelis and Jews around the world have a tragic new way of marking what date it is... February 1st is October 118th. May the longest October we have ever endured come to an end as soon as possible with the complete destruction of Hamas- כן יהי רצון.
